

FIRST DAY OF ISSUE!

Flag stamp to be issued Jan. 27 at Georgia show



A new United States Flag definitive stamp will be issued during the opening day of The Southeastern Stamp Expo. The newest Flag stamp will be issued Jan. 27 in Norcross, Ga., a suburb of Atlanta.

The stamp will be issued at an 11 a.m. ceremony during the Southeastern Stamp Expo, taking place at the Hilton Atlanta Northeast, 5993 Peachtree Industrial Blvd., Norcross, GA 30092.

USPS Chief Human Resources Officer and Executive Vice President Jeff Williamson; American Philatelic Society President Mick Zais, a retired brigadier general in the U.S. Army; and USPS Director of Stamp Services Mary-Anne Penner will be participating in the ceremony.

It is a rare opportunity for residents of this area to attend a first day ceremony. All who are interested in attending this occasion should get together to travel to the show. Consider this opportunity at our January meeting and make plans to attend.

Life member of the Chattanooga Stamp Club, Jim Cate, will be showing a 10-frame exhibit of fancy cancellations of the 3-cent 1861 issues on cover at the Southeastern Expo. This exhibit has only been shown one other time in Atlanta years ago.

The Chattanooga Stamp Club welcomes all interested parties to join with us in this New Year! 2017 dues are due and payable if not already paid. See the treasurer, Carl Anderson to bring your membership up to date.

Buryatia Stamps (An explanation)



Known as the Buryatia Republic. It is part of the Siberian Federal District of Russia.

It is situated on the border with Mongolia. The Republic of Buryatia is a federal subject of Russia (a republic), located in Asia in Siberia. Its capital is the city of Ulan-Ude. Its area is 135,600 sq mi with a population of 972,021 (2010 Census).

The Soviet Union broke up and was replaced by the Russian Federation more than 25 years ago. Russia comprises numerous larger and smaller republics which run their own local affairs. However the Russian postal service serves the entire federation very much like the USPS, and no local Russian states are allowed to run their own postal systems releasing postage stamps.

Soon after the break-up of the Soviet Union, stamps from individual states making up Russia began to be offered. At first they were in the form old Soviet postage stamps with overprints added.

In philately, a Cinderella stamp is "virtually anything resembling a postage stamp, but not issued for postal purposes by a government postal administration..." The term also excludes imprinted stamps on postal stationery.

No one should tell you what to collect. But it is only fair that collectors know what they are buying if they want to add Republic of Buryatia stamps to their stamp albums. Just be aware these type of stamps are not legal postage.

Abyssinia. Ethiopia (q.v.).

Acambaro. District of Mexico which issued revolutionary

provisionals in 1914.

Acaponeta. District of Mexico which issued a revolutionary provisional in 1914.

Accessories. A wide range of accessories is available to aid the modern collector, including hinges and mounts of various kinds, magnifiers, tweezers, perforation and measurement gauges, color guides, etc. In the stamp trade other goods such as albums, catalogues, and philatelic books are not usually looked on as 'accessories' but are more frequently considered 'departments' on

Acores. The Azores. Portuguese Atlantic islands. First issues were Portuguese general issues o/p in 1868, followed by colonial key-types. Since 1931 uses general issues of Portugal. Area: 922 sq. m.; pop. (1930): 253,935; capital: Ponta Delgada; currency: 1853: 1,000 reis = 1 milreis; 1912: 100 centavos -- 1 escudo.

Adams &. Co.'s Express. U.S.A. Pacific coast local issues of 1854-5. There was also an Adams City Express Post operating in New York in 1850, and was possibly the Atlantic coast affiliation of the Californian company.

Additional Halfpenny. From 1813 to 1839 hand-struck markings of this type were applied, in certain circumstances, to mail passing from England to Scotland. They denoted that an extra 1/2d. postage was chargeable. The additional charge was authorised to reimburse the Post Office for tolls paid by mailcoaches on Scottish turnpike roads.

Adelie Land. French possession in Antarctica, first discovered by Dumont Durville in 1840. In 1948 a French expedition established a base in Adelie Land, and in January 1950 a Madagascar stamp was overprinted 'Terre Adelie-Dumont Durville 1840' for use there. Since 1955 Adelie Land has used the stamps of the French Southern and Antarctic Territories, q.v.

Aden. British colony and protectorate in South Arabia. First annexed to British India in 1839, Aden used Indian stamps until it became a separate Crown Colony on 1 April, 1937. On the same day Aden's first distinctive stamps were issued, a set of pictorials in the famous Dhow design. Area of colony and protectorate: about 112,000 sq. m. Pop. (est. 1960): 660,000. Colony only: 75 sq. m. Pop. (est. 1964): 210,000. Indian currency was in use until 1951; thereafter East African currency—100 cents = Is. Since 1963 the colony of Aden has formed part of the South Arabian Federation (q.v.).

Aden States. Only two of the sultanates of the Aden Protectorate issue their own stamps—Kathiri State of Seiyun and Qu'Aiti State of Shihr and Mukalla, otherwise known as Qu'Aiti State in Hadhramaut. In philatelic literature these two states, which together make up the Eastern Aden Protectorate, are usually referred to as Aden (Kathiri) and Aden (Qu'Aiti). Stamps first issued 1942.
