# Smallest and Largest Postage Stamps By Steve Swain

When I tell someone I am a stamp collector, invariably they ask, "What is the most valuable stamp in your collection?" That is typically followed by, "What is the oldest stamp in your collection?" Of course, I can answer those questions. But no one has ever asked me, "What is the smallest and largest stamp in your collection?" I never really considered that, but it prompted me to do some research.

The smallest U.S. stamp to date is Scott #1734, the 1978 13-cent Indian Head Penny issue, shown below on the left. The 1-cent coin used as the stamp's vignette was produced by the United States Bureau of Mint from 1859 to 1909. The 1978 stamp was an experiment to lower production costs and increase output. Measuring just .54" x .66", customers said it was too small and easily lost. The standard postage stamp dimensions are roughly 0.87 inches x 0.98 inches. This is the stamp size for the American flag Forever stamp. And, yes, I do have this stamp in my collection!





The largest U.S. stamp is the 1997 Mars Rover Sojourner souvenir sheet issue, Scott #3178, shown above on the right. It measures 3" x 1.5". NASA successfully landed the Mars Pathfinder spacecraft on Mars on July 4, 1997. Pathfinder launched a rover named Sojourner, which was the first rover to operate on another planet. Sojourner explored Mars for almost three months before communications with the rover failed in October of 1997. Unfortunately, I do not have this stamp in my collection.

As for non-U.S. stamps, the smallest is the 1863 Bolivar issue shown below on the left. (Bolivar was formed as one of the nine United States of Colombia after the civil war in 1860-1862.) The stamp is 8mm x 9.5mm in size, which is exceptionally small. A standard U.S. stamp is 22.10mm x 24.89mm. The stamp depicts the Coat of Arms of Bolivar, with stars traced around the Coat of Arms. The stamp exists in two versions - a version with 6 stars below, as shown here, and a version with 5 stars below. Both versions are rare, with the 5-star version carrying the highest catalogue value.





The largest stamp is the 1905-12 China Express letter issue, shown above on the right. Measuring 210mm x 65mm, it has a large dragon design, Type E 36, and is divided into four parts by serrated roulette. The borders of imperforate. I have neither the Bolivia nor the China stamp in my collection. As mentioned, the Bolivian stamp is quite rare.

My research revealed other "small" and "large" stamps. Take a few minutes and have some fun with internet research on such issues.

### Arago change

If you have used the National Postal Museum site Arago to research stamps you will want to know that it has been replaced by "Search the Collection" at <a href="http://postalmuseum.si.edu/search-the-collection">http://postalmuseum.si.edu/search-the-collection</a>. This was necessary because the 14 year-old software was no longer supported.

If you have not visited the National Postal Museum, you should check out their YouTube site. There are links to lectures and videos of museum exhibits.
